How To Care For Your Quilt

Please realize that quilts should not be stored in plastic bags. It is recommended that they be stored either in a large pillowcase, a sheet, or with tissue paper. New quilts may be washed with care if necessary, but be aware that some dark colors may bleed. Machine wash in cold water, with mild soap and on delicate cycle. Either line dry or use your dryer on air fluff only. Do not use heat settings on the dryer.


A planned gift to the Church of the Brethren helps sustain our mission and ministry, like Brethren Disaster Ministries, into the future. One planned giving strategy to consider is a **Qualified Charitable Distribution** (QCD). It is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian to a qualified charity.



In addition to supporting a charity, a QCD is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA because it excludes the amount donated from taxable income and can reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare. QCDs can also be counted toward your Required Minimum Distributions (RMD) for the year if:

- Your age is 70 ½ or older,
- the amount of the QCD does not exceed what would be taxed as ordinary income, which excludes nondeductible contributions,
- the sum of all annual QCDs does not exceed \$108,000 per individual, AND
- for the QCD to count toward you minimum annual IRA distribution, it must be made by Dec. 31 of the tax year in question.



These reflections from people who work with and observe Brethren Disaster Ministries' (BDM) programs demonstrate that the staff and volunteers embrace and embody the call heard in 1 John. Their deeds and the truth are evident in how they live and all they do to bring healing, hope, and recovery to disaster survivors. Those who support BDM's ministries through prayer, financial contributions, in-kind donations, advocacy, and volunteering at all levels, including disaster auctions, join as partners in our mission to show God's love.

Hurricane Helene, which struck Florida on Sept. 26, 2024, and moved north causing major flooding all the way to southern Virginia, was a reminder of how devastating and unpredictable disasters can be. However, such storms also highlight the strength of the Church working together for our neighbor's good. All of BDM actively responded to this catastrophic event, including Children's Disaster Services (CDS) sending volunteer teams to North Carolina; multiple coordinating calls with the Southeastern and Atlantic Southeast Districts; volunteer and relief supply coordination with the Virlina District and Camp Carmel; the purchase of special supplies such as mold remediation materials; and providing Emergency Disaster Fund (EDF) grants to support district level responses. The mission expanded when Hurricane Milton struck Florida two weeks later, compounding the damage from Helene and prompting the sending of additional CDS teams. Working together through Christ, the BDM network helped "bear one another's burdens." Hurricanes Helene and Milton were just two of many disasters and crises that BDM responded to in 2024.

Children's Disaster Services volunteers served in eight MARCs (multi-agency resource centers) in response to multiple tornadoes in the South Central, Midwest, and Southeastern US regions in the spring and summer of 2024 and also responded to one flooding event and four wildfires. In the fall, at the request of the Red Cross to care for children impacted by the hurricanes, three CDS teams served four weeks in shelters and a Family Assistance Center in the Asheville, N.C., area and two teams served in shelters in the Tampa Bay, Fla. During the year CDS responded to 13 disasters, sending 68 volunteers who served 729 child contacts.

In early January 2025 wildfires in California stretched CDS to respond in multiple locations with four teams serving 515 children in the area in a little over a month.

The Rebuilding Program completed 22 months of service to families impacted by the 2021 tornadoes in Dawson Springs, Ky. Additional support for this project site came from a Lowe's 2024 Winter Cycle Reconstruction Grant facilitated through NVOAD (National Voluntary

In response to the deadly 2022 flooding in Eastern Kentucky, a BDM volunteer group served survivors for a week in April 2024 in Letcher County and a new long-term site opened there in the fall. BDM's partner described its arrival in September as "perfect timing" because they were lacking volunteers just at the time that federal and state funding was becoming available to build new homes.

Smaller responses included collaboration with the leadership in three districts in Pennsylvania to coordinate local flood responses in the Eastwick/Cobbs Creek neighborhood of Philadelphia and in York County. Two EDF grants were provided for the York County response to purchase materials installed by BDM volunteers and to support a local partner providing Disaster Case Management.

Through our project sites, 39 families received support from 600 weekly volunteers who provided 4,636 hours of service on their homes. This free labor provided a cost savings of \$1,242,077 to the families and local partners. Sixty-five disaster project leaders served in 2024.

Tragically, in 2024 international responses once again focused much more on supporting families impacted by violence, a human-caused crisis, than on natural disasters. A total of \$564,000 in EDF grants funded war-related relief and recovery programs in the DR Congo, Lebanon, Nigeria, Palestine, South Sudan, and Ukraine. This was the first year that grants provided aid and relief to families impacted by the Israel-Hamas war in the Palestinian territories and Israel's attacks on Hezbollah in southern Lebanon. Smaller grants provided critical storm and flood relief in Burundi, the DR Congo, Dominican Republic, and South Sudan. Grants to partners in Mexico and the Dominican Republic supported the needs of refugees. Another area of ongoing focus is a response to the crisis in Haiti, including a failed government and sections of the country controlled by violent gangs, leaving families and congregations struggling to survive.

The Nigeria Crisis Response (NCR), in collaboration with EYN (Church of the Brethren in Nigeria), remains the largest global program. In 2024, this program received \$225,000 in EDF funds. Amidst ongoing, and often increasing, violence and insecurity, NCR maintains its focus on sponsorship of camps for internally displaced people; food distributions; medical assistance; livelihood training centers for widows and orphans; seeds and fertilizer; new wells for drinking water; education assistance for orphan children; and home repairs for the most vulnerable.

We usually highlight BDM financial reports in the auction booklet. Unfortunately, due to technical issues with our computer servers, year-end financial information was not available when this letter was written. Our year-end tables, graphs, and financial reports will be available during the auction.

This ministry is only possible because the whole church is working together. Individual members and supporters, volunteers, churches, districts, and the Mid-Atlantic District Disaster Response Auction are part of the body of Christ coming together to pray, serve, give hope, and help families heal. Through all this we pray more people come to God and know God's amazing love.



Thanks to all the volunteers who have given of their time and talents supporting Brethren Disaster Ministries (BDM) over the years at many sites around the country! Your willingness to help with childcare, rebuild homes, provide household support, cook meals, or help support BDM and its volunteers through your prayers, encouragement, donations, auction purchases, or by any other means, have made a tremendous difference to those whose lives have been impacted by natural and man-made disasters.

A special thanks to those who volunteered, many over several weeks, to repair or rebuild the homes and enable homeowners to return to their homes. The Mid-Atlantic District (MAD) Church of the Brethren continues to be well represented by its volunteers who worked on BDM rebuild project sites in Dawson Springs, KY (tornado response) and Letcher County in Eastern KY (flooding response) in 2024, serving approximately 375 volunteer workdays, and are off to a good start in Letcher County, KY this year.

Brethren Disaster Ministries provides help to people in need of assistance to regain use of their home after it has been damaged or destroyed by natural disasters. The program provides a helpful and safe environment for volunteers to assist in repairing or rebuilding homes and to provide childcare and hope to the homeowners. This is a great opportunity for people to use their talents and gifts, to teach others construction and household skills, to learn new skills, all while enjoying the comradery of fellow volunteers and helping those who are hurting and in need. Volunteer housing is provided, often at local churches or community buildings, where weekly volunteers and leaders stay, eat, and become more connected with the community. 2025 California Wildfires: Responding to Short and Long-term Needs

The 2025 California wildfire season took the new year by surprise when five fires broke out on January 7, with five additional fires added within days. The two largest fires, Palisades and Eaton, fueled by strong Santa Ana winds, grew quickly and were not contained until January 31, after burning 23,707 and 14,201 acres respectively, in the Pacific Palisades, Altadena, and Pasadena communities. These two fires alone destroyed 16,251 structures, damaged another 2,046, and caused 29 deaths. Residents of a large swath of the area north/northwest of Los Angeles were under various evacuation orders, affecting close to 200,000 at one point.

As Brethren Disaster Ministries' (BDM) program of first response, Children's Disaster Services (CDS) responded to the needs of children whose families were evacuated from and/or survived the fires. A total of 25 volunteers served in four different CDS teams, with the first teams arriving just a week after the fires began. These dedicated volunteers cared for 515 children in a little over four weeks.

In addition to sending CDS teams, BDM immediately began monitoring the effects of the fires and the needs of survivors by contacting fellow National VOAD (Volunteer Agencies Active in Disaster) members; participating in calls and receiving updates from California VOAD (CAL VOAD) and its Los Angeles unit, the Emergency Network Los Angeles (ENLA), as well as local emergency managers. Importantly, BDM also reached out to Russ Matteson, district executive of the Pacific Southwest District (PSWD) of the Church of the Brethren, and district disaster coordinators (DDCs) Lois and Lindy Frantz. These efforts helped to keep BDM informed of the situation on the ground as it discerned how best to be engaged during both the short and the long-term response.

PSWD's Matteson shared the initial news that the parsonage of the Church of the Brethren

Conexion Pasadena congregation was destroyed in the first days of the Eaton fire. Fortunately, Pastors Juan Pablo Plaza and Adriana Rios and their children were traveling at the time, so no one was injured. The church, located some miles away, did not have fire damage but a window that broke allowed smoke and soot to enter the church building. The Church of the Brethren building is also home to the Pasadena Mennonite Church, another non-denominational congregation, and a school. The process of cleaning and restoring began at the end of January with plans to return to worship in the building in mid-February.

The district established a fund to support the pastors and other members affected by the fires in some way, such as fire damage, impact on livelihoods, and other ripple effects. BDM continues to discuss how Emergency Disaster Fund (EDF) grants might assist the district and its churches with relief and recovery.

CAL VOAD opened a seven-day Wildfire Resource Hub for wildfire survivors on January 27 which provided a unique opportunity for local and national non-governmental organizations (NGOs), including faith-based organizations, to extend assistance as a complement to the efforts of FEMA and other federal and state agencies. A multitude of services, supplies, and support were on offer for free, from financial aid, massage therapy, and new eyeglasses, to hot meals, groceries, and prescriptions. Longtime BDM partner Church World Service (CWS) played a key leadership role in the Hub. One of the CDS volunteer teams provided a safe environment for children while their families focused on receiving resources and support.

Shifting to long-term recovery after a wildfire involves a massive effort to rebuild the devastated areas. This is particularly complicated in California, partly due to rising costs and regulations aimed at building back stronger to withstand the next fire

> or other disaster. Matteson and the BDM staff have been in close communication with local and national representatives of Mennonite Disaster Service (MDS), whose rebuilding program, which is similar to BDM's, meets the requirements needed to work in California. CDS Volunteers Bring Comfort and Hope in California

How can one describe the importance of bringing comfort and hope by giving caring support to others during times of crises? Children's Disaster Services (CDS) volunteers answer that question by sharing their experiences.

While working at the disaster recovery center, providing a space for children whose families had been affected by the [wildfire], I came across a couple with two young boys, one of whom was visibly upset and crying. When I told them we could take the boys to our play area while they took care of what they needed to do, the mother looked dubious and told me that one of them had autism and had a tendency to elope. I assured her that I was a retired special education teacher and had experience with children with autism. They brought the kids to our area. The boy with autism took a little while to settle in but soon both boys were playing happily with play dough and Magna-Tiles. When the parents came back, they told me they had been watching through the window and were happy to see him playing. They thanked us and said that they had been about to call the grandparents to come and get the boys because they had realized they wouldn't be able to get anything done if the boys were with them. I said it must be hard to go through all of these changes with a child who needs his routine, and she talked a little about how hard it had been. - Andi Kuenning

These children and their grateful parents were among many served by four CDS teams, totaling 25 volunteers, who served in Los Angeles during the weeks when wildfires, especially the Palisades and Eaton fires which began on Jan. 7, 2025, engulfed the area. Two teams of seven volunteers began service on January 14 and 15, respectively, Upon their arrival at Disaster Recovery Centers (DRCs) opened by the Red Cross and FEMA, the volunteers set up centers to care for children, equipped with "Kits of Comfort" which include toys and art supplies carefully chosen to encourage creative play a key tool in helping children process trauma.

A third CDS team, consisting of volunteers from the Los Angeles area and northern California, arrived on January 27 to serve for a week at the Wildfire Resource Hub in Pasadena,

organized by the California VOAD (Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster) to serve families affected by the fires with supplies, services, and a place to relax away from the chaos of the disaster. CDS cared for the children while their parents/guardians sought assistance. The fourth and final team of volunteers arrived on January 30 and set up in a DRC in Altadena, one of the hardest hit areas.

Due to the scale and complexity of service needs during this disaster situation, CDS teams had to remain flexible. Several times during their period of service, teams were asked to switch between service locations, covering care for children across centers in six locations in Pasadena, Los Angeles, and Altadena. CDS associate director Carolyn Neher visited with each team, helping to coordinate their response.

CDS volunteers cared for 515 children during the nearly five-week California wildfire response. Reporting on the number of children served, however, only tells a portion of the story. It does not fully describe the value of the service provided, especially as regards the beginning of a healing process for children. A volunteer serving at the Resource Hub observed how letting a child direct their play in a calm and safe space can help them process their experience and begin to recover.

Late in the day a little boy was dropped off by his mother. When she was gone, he began crying and wouldn't play. I held him and rocked and sang to him until he quieted and settled. He said he wanted to get down and I asked, "Would you like to play?" He said no. Another volunteer picked up pool noodles and started batting some balls around hockey style. He immediately grabbed a noodle and began playing. After a minute or so he paused and said, "My house burned down. I don't have toys anymore." And he continued to play. – David Franklin

Like many CDS volunteers David reflected on another value of service with Children's Disaster Services. He said, "I come home more blessed than when I left."

under the coordination of the DDCs, have already served periodically on MDS projects in response to other fires in the state. BDM and district leadership will continue to communicate with MDS to learn of opportunities to partner with them, including possibly sending volunteers to serve with them. Given the scale of the disaster that may be at least nine months or more away.

Invaded and Occupied: DR Congo Churches Receive Aid

On Jan. 27, 2025, M23, a well-armed rebel group, invaded the city of Goma, the capital city of about two million residents of the North Kivu Province in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DR Congo/DRC). M23 is widely accepted to be supported with funds, arms, and troops from neighboring Rwanda, although Rwanda denies involvement. Estimates are that more than 3,000 people died, and thousands were injured during the advance to and takeover of Goma. As of mid-February 2025, M23 had consolidated control over Goma, nearby mineral-rich areas, and the surrounding supply lines, and had also taken over Bukavu, the capital city of the South Kivu Province. The M23 declared that it would continue marching until it reached the capital city of Kinshasa. Goma and Bukavu are the two largest cities in Eastern DR Congo. A majority of the Eglise des Freres au Congo (Church of the Brethren in DR Congo) churches are located in South Kivu. The situation was still changing as this Bridges went to print.

The Goma occupation has been devastating to the Brethren members of Goma Center church and the recently planted Magunga church, located just outside the city near the camps for displaced people. Many church members have sheltered with host families in Goma. During the first chaotic days there was no electricity, markets and services were closed, and leaving one's home for necessities such as water or food was extremely dangerous. Once the fighting subsided, the situation remained precarious and tense, with uncertainty as to who was responsible for authority in the city. While there has been no reported loss of life among the Brethren, there is limited access to food and water, partly due to the looting and destruction during the chaos of the first few days.

Bukavu also experienced looting after M23 took over that city.

The current situation is part of a long history of violence by various militia and rebel groups in the eastern part of the country. M23 took over Goma briefly in 2012. Its latest resurgence began in early 2022 in the areas north of Goma, resulting in the displacement of millions of people, with up to one million fleeing to the areas around Goma. Some lived in official Internally Displaced Person (IDP) camps while many lived in desperate makeshift camps on vacant land.

As soon as the displaced began appearing outside of Goma in May 2022, the Congolese Brethren committed to providing them with whatever assistance they could manage. From 2022 to 2024, in partnership with Brethren Disaster Ministries (BDM), the Congolese church received seven EDF grants totaling \$221,500 to support humanitarian aid programs for carefully selected beneficiaries, concentrating on the most vulnerable, including households headed by women, youth, and the elderly; people who are disabled; orphans, young children, and school children; and pregnant women.

An additional 400,000 displaced people sought shelter and aid in Goma as fighting increased in early 2025. Since then some areas where IDPs settled or squatted have been damaged or closed, with M23 telling the people to go "home", although many of the homes from which they fled have been destroyed. The complex situation that existed before the invasion has become even more desperate and complicated.

BDM staff have remained in contact, as much as possible, with the Congolese church leaders throughout the crisis. Relief planning for 2025 that had begun prior to the takeover of Goma

> pivoted to an EDF grant of \$30,000 to provide emergency aid to families in the town who have few resources to obtain food and water. Church leaders are distributing aid in small amounts to the most vulnerable church members and their neighbors, using care to avoid calling attention to the activities due to competition for scarce commodities and the possible presence of armed rebels, former soldiers, and criminals. Planning for an expanded and ongoing relief program continues between BDM and Congolese church leaders. *continued on next page*

Rebuilding Updates

Letcher County, Ky.

In September 2024, Brethren Disaster Ministries (BDM) opened a rebuilding project site in Letcher County, Ky., to support recovery from flooding in 2022. In partnership with HOMES Inc., a local organization, volunteers have been working on repairing damaged homes (with many being elevated) and working on new construction on higher ground properties to enable families to relocate out of the floodplains.

Volunteer housing is located in Fleming-Neon, Ky., in multiple buildings owned by HOMES Inc. This project is scheduled to stay open through the end of 2025. 
Rwanda

During the takeover of Goma, the fighting spilled across the nearby border with Rwanda, with artillery killing two members of the Rwanda Church of the Brethren and damaging homes. A special offering by Rwandan Church members provided food, supplies, and cash assistance to these families. Church leaders created a relief committee that identified 11 households with severely damaged homes belonging to "poverty stricken and vulnerable households" and/or families which lost loved ones, including several church members. An \$8,600 EDF grant is providing building materials and labor to repair or rebuild these homes.

Dawson Springs, Ky.

After almost two years in partnership with Habitat for Humanity of the Pennyrile Region, the Dawson Springs, Ky., project closed. In this time, BDM helped to rebuild 53 new homes for families impacted by the 2021 tornadoes that ripped through the area just before Christmas.

Thank you to all the volunteers and leaders who served on this site from January 2022 through November 2024 to bring hope, and in some cases first-time homeownership, to the survivors we served.

A Journey of Service—My Time with Brethren Disaster Ministries

Growing up in Lesotho, a small landlocked country inside of South Africa, I always dreamed of traveling, meeting new people, experiencing different cultures, and trying new things. But where I come from, traveling is a privilege, and for many, it remains just a dream. I didn't have the money to explore the world, but I always believed that God has His own way of making things happen. In my case, that was through volunteer service.

When I arrived in Letcher County, Ky., in September 2024 to begin my Brethren Volunteer Service (BVS) working with Brethren Disaster Ministries (BDM), I didn't know what to expect. All I knew was that I had come to serve, to help rebuild homes, and to be part of something bigger than myself. I am grateful to every person I have met along the way: volunteers, homeowners, team leaders, local community members, and everyone who has been part of this journey. Each of you has played a

Every Monday morning, I would come in and see a new group of volunteers with smiles on their faces, eager to work and willing to accomplish goals that they have set for themselves. They give of their time, skills, and knowledge with the best of intentions. In the 8 months I have been privileged to work with BDM, they have built 14 houses for tornado victims in Dawson Springs, Ky. 14! This has been along with numerous other projects in their community. BDM is a first-class organization with first class people from top to bottom. It has been a blessing to be associated and work with such an outstanding group of people.

Global Updates

Conflict in the Middle East: Building Dignity and Hope

Since the attack on an Israeli community by Hamas militants in October 2023, and the war that followed, four Emergency Disaster Fund (EDF) grants totaling \$115,000 have supported the most vulnerable people impacted by the conflict in Gaza, Lebanon, Israel, and the West Bank. As of mid-February, the Jan. 19, 2025, ceasefire has offered some hope that the war may end. More than 50,000 people have been killed in the region–Israeli, Palestinian (94 percent of the deaths), and Lebanese-and there has been catastrophic building and infrastructure damage in Gaza. EDF grants to partners in the area were carefully considered while BDM staff worked on a response plan that matched the interest and support of church members.

In October 2024, a \$35,000 grant to Lebanese Society for Education and Social Development (LSESD), a trusted long-term partner, provided support for families displaced from southern Lebanon by the conflict between Hezbollah and Israel. By October 2024, the conflict had displaced more than 100,000 in Lebanon. The grant provided food, hygiene supplies, mattresses, and blankets for 500 displaced families (2,000 people).

In November 2024, two grants supported Palestinian families, including Christians. The first was a \$25,000 grant to The Palestinian Conflict Transformation Center (Wi'am) to support specialized care for children in Gaza and the West Bank impacted by the war. Children are often the silent victims of conflict, enduring a war they cannot escape. The program includes providing safe spaces, psychosocial support, trauma-informed care, and community engagement, all of which are shown to help reduce the long-term impact of trauma in children. These services are combined with food aid and other Wi'am programs to provide a comprehensive response.

The second grant for \$25,000 was to The Shepherd Society to provide relief programming for displaced Palestinians in Gaza and the West Bank. The Shepherd Society is the humanitarian outreach arm of Bethlehem Bible College, a Christian college located in the West Bank. This grant supports a larger program that includes emergency food distributions, the repairing and equipping of a medical clinic in Gaza, cold weather supplies such as blankets and coats, and a trauma counseling training program.

A January 2025 grant of \$30,000 is supporting a program for children in Gaza by International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC). As part of a The Shepherd Society supports food distributions to vulnerable families in Gaza affected by the conflict. Photo courtesy of The Shepherd Society



larger comprehensive program, these funds will support a project that aims to mitigate the adverse effects of continuous exposure to violence, loss, and displacement experienced by children in Gaza. It integrates protection programs, psychosocial and physical support, and recreational activities to provide children, half of whom have disabilities, with the necessary support and assistance to help them cope with traumatic experiences and regain a sense of security and well-being.

BDM is also in discussion with other partners regarding the rebuilding of Gaza with a focus on medical clinics, schools, and shelter. If the ceasefire holds, additional grants supporting rebuilding are possible.

Nigeria Crisis Response Update

Planning for the 2025 joint response of the US Church of the Brethren and Ekklesiyar Yan'uwa a Nigeria (EYN, the Church of the Brethren in Nigeria) was finalized during Roy Winter's November 2024 visit to the EYN headquarters in Kwarhi, Nigeria. This was the first in-person meeting between Winter and the new EYN leaders, including Daniel Mbaya (president), Nuhu Mutah Abba (vice president), James K. Musa (general secretary), and Bitrus Duwara (director of Disaster Relief Management/ DRM). The time of meeting and fellowship with EYN leadership and the leadership of Kulp Theological Seminary was a wonderful reminder of the hospitality that EYN shared even before the current crisis.

Roy spent a significant amount of time with Bitrus and the DRM team to finalize the Nigeria Crisis Response program priorities for 2025 which include agriculture, education for children, food distributions, and clean water projects. A challenging issue is the high number of people who remain displaced from their homes due to ongoing violence. These families often need help with food and livelihoods to survive, which limits the funding available to repair homes and resettle families in safer areas. DRM is working on identifying funding sources to enable the continuation of the crisis response after Church of the Brethren funding concludes at the end of 2026.





Driving Directions to the Auction



From the North:

(directions given from Hanover, PA to the Ag Center) Take Rt. 94 South (becomes MD Rt. 30 at the state line). Follow 30 to Manchester and turn right on Rt. 27. Follow Rt. 27 to Rt. 140 East (in Westminster). Turn left onto the ramp to 140 East and travel to the first traffic light. Turn right onto Center Street. Take Center Street through two traffic lights to Gist Road. Turn right on Gist Road and follow signs to new entrance. Turn right onto Ag Center drive.

From the South:

Take Interstate 270 North to Rt. 27. Follow Rt. 27 to Kate Wagner Road. (Kate Wagner Road intersects Rt. 27 before you reach the city of Westminster.) Make a right onto Kate Wagner Road (which intersects Rt. 27 at a traffic light) and follow approximately 1.2 miles. Turn left onto Gist Road. Continue on Gist Road until you reach Smith Ave at stop sign. Continue on Gist Road about 1/2 block and make left at Ag Center entrance,

From the East:

From Baltimore Beltway 695, take Interstate 795 north toward Westminster. Follow the signs onto MD 140 and take 140 into Westminster. Turn left onto Center Street. Take Center Street through two traffic lights to Gist Road. Turn right on Gist Road and follow signs to new entrance. turn right onto Ag Center drive.

From the West:

Take I-70 East to the Mt. Airy/Route 27 Exit. Head North on Rt. 27 toward Westminster for approximately 15 miles. Make a right onto Kate Wagner Road (which intersects Rt. 27 at a traffic light) and follow approximately 1.2 miles. Turn left onto Gist Road. Continue on Gist Road until you reach Smith Ave at stop sign. Continue on Gist Road about 1/2 block and make left at Ag Center entrance.
